Dear Spiritual Companions:

Chant instills in us an inner gesture of listening and response. Chant is useless from a pragmatic point of view, yet chant celebrates and gives glory to God. Listening to chant purposefully adds meaning. Listening to chant helps us to be in the *now* - the only time we have to be present, to be perfect, to be free, to be holy.

Daily living challenges us to 'awaken' to the NOW, to listen with our inner ears. WVIS offers a chant to punctuate our centering prayer practice for 20 minutes on ZOOM at 7 p.m., Monday through Friday. The community of believers gathers as a witness to T. S. Eliot's *you are the music while the music lasts*. The community experiences the fullness of sound, the Sacred Silence.

I encourage you to attend our Centering prayer practice and to read, <u>Music of Silence</u>, by David Steindl-Rast and Sharon Lebell to see how to 'be here now' and how to listen to the sacred natural rhythms of the hours of each day so as to assist us with living fully the daily hours and practicing 'being a chant' that instills listening in ourselves and others.

Spiritual Nurturer for Presbyterian Women of the Shenandoah Presbytery

The Presbyterian Women are committed to providing information about justice and peace and ministry as part of our mission and community-building work. We desire to build an inclusive, caring community of women that strengthens the Presbyterian Church. On April 15th, in Harrisonburg, VA, the Presbyterian Women's Coordinating Team of the Shenandoah of Virginia Presbytery, held their annual meeting. At that time, I proposed a change of title for an elected board position from *Worship Leader* to that of *Spiritual Nurturer*.

The proposal included that, as Spiritual Nurturer, one is given the responsibility to provide a safe place for members to center themselves in God's love, to help others to say and sort through the integration of spiritual values into the activities and events of their daily lives, and to share information to promote spiritual growth. Additionally, other responsibilities of the Spiritual Nurturer are to encourage and promote fellowship among members of the Presbytery Women, lead opening and closing devotion for gatherings, and acknowledge birthdays, illness, death, or other occasions with appropriate cards, phone calls, or other forms of communication.

I was honored to be elected to the role of Spiritual Nurturer for the Presbyterian Woman Coordinating team for the Shenandoah Presbytery and will serve through 2024. In this role, I look forward to helping individuals find a safe place to share stories, life experiences and to deepen their relationship with God.

and a wagon wheel outside my window just hit a bump which turned into an ecstatic chorus of the Beloved's Name.

There is the Prayer Call, rising up like the sun out of the mouths of a thousand birds.

There is an astonishing vastness of movement and life emanating sound and light from my folded hands, and my even quieter simple being and heart.

My dear, is it true that your mind is sometimes like a battering ram, running all through the city shouting so madly inside and out about the ten thousand things that do not matter?

Hafiz, too, for many years beat his head in youth and thought himself at a great distance, far from and armistice with God.

But that is why this scarred old pilgrim has become such a sweet rare vintage who weeps and sings for you.

That is why Hafiz will forever in his verse play his cymbal and call to you.

O listen—listen more carefully to what is inside of you right now.

In my world, all that remains is the wondrous call to dance and prayer rising up like a thousand suns ... out of the mouth of a single bird.

Earthly Accidents Make Us Responsible

Before Easter I was trying to keep up with all the demands of the season when I decided to take a quick walk along the river. During that walk, I passed an elderly woman with a walker. I greeted her and I wanted to keep walking, but she eagerly responded and proceeded to engage me in a conversation.

She told me how good it was to meet someone who wasn't on their phone or wearing headphones. People around her talked on devices but never talked to each other. She envied those people because they were connected to others; she was so isolated. We spoke briefly and I soon hurried away. But something didn't feel right and I thought of a line from Fr. Ron Rolheiser's book The Passion and the Cross: "Pure earthly accidents often make us responsible for what is divine, and they conscript us to our real work – helping Simon of Cyrene carry the cross of Jesus."

I walked back and again encountered the woman. I spent some time chatting and listening to her story. It was then, I made a commitment to take my walks so I could assist her in carrying the cross of her isolation through compassionate conversation.
